

# 1. Theme of the Seminar

The necessity of the seminar emerges out of the fact that the largest democracy in this globe i.e. India holds 42 percent of female faculties in Higher Education against 58 percent of their male counterparts. Despite the well decorated gender friendly policies in different universities, colleges or the stand alone institutions, the participation of women leaders is very low. It is mostly due to the glass ceiling approach that stops women from holding leadership positions in Indian academia. The presence of 7 female Vice Chancellors in 54 Central universities across the country indicates the alarming status of gender discrimination in Higher Education (Jain, 2022).

Human history had has witnessed the intolerance of men towards the female leadership. The father of all sciences, Aristotle remarked on the inferior status of women, hence he kept females aside from authority. By denying their civil rights, he affirmed, 'women's rightful place is the household chores'. This established myth has still dominated the present trends.

Although women have made remarkable development in academia but it is very difficult to quantify. Family responsibility, motherhood, lack of social acceptance and self motivation, lack of gender friendly policies, sexual harassment at work place and most importantly male chauvinism against women leadership are the guiding factors behind the poor leadership roles of women in Higher education. The institutional formalism between the female friendly policies and their real applications has marked serious shortage of female leaders in Higher Education sector. The COVID 19 has widened the gender disparity in various regular sectors including academics. Women faced more terminations from men during the pandemic. 'Women are incapacitated for leadership' myth has further accentuated the gender stereotype among the patriarchs.

The main purpose of the seminar is not the inculcate misandrist values but to actualize gender specific structure to ease the path of equality for 'half the sky'. With the main theme of gender parity in Higher Education, in the background, the Department of Political Science, Ambedkar College, invites interested researchers and academicians from various social science disciplines in universities and research institutes for presentation of their papers in the seminar. 

#### 4. Summary of Sessions

The main purpose of the seminar is not to inculcate misandrist values but to actualize gender specific structure to ease the path of equality for 'half the sky'. Although women have made remarkable development in academia but it is very difficult to quantify. Family responsibility, motherhood, lack of social acceptance and self motivation, lack of gender friendly policies, sexual harassment at work place and most importantly male chauvinism against women leadership are the guiding factors behind the poor leadership roles of women in Higher education. The institutional formalism between the female friendly policies and their real applications has marked serious shortage of female leaders in Higher Education sector. The COVID 19 has widened the gender disparity in various regular sectors including academics. Though the main aim of the seminar is to find the Issues and challenges for bringing gender equality in HEIs, but the presenters had thrown light on other aspects of gender disparity. The day started with an inaugural session. The session was inaugurated by the Dr Deepak kumar, IAS, Assistant Collector. The Organising secretary, Dr Dipikanta Chakraborty has given welcome address to the gathering. It was followed by the enlightening keynote address by Prof Chandrika Basu Majumder. The two Resource Persons - Dr Biplob Debnath and Dr Swarupa Bhattacharjee were also present in the dais. The inaugural session had been ended by the vote of thanks, delivered by the Prinicpal i/c. Dr Subrata Sharma.

The Technical Session started at 12.15 PM, chaired by De Swarupa Bhattacherjee. The after-lunch session was presided over by Dr Biplob Debnath and Prof. Jayati Gupta. The presenters have touched different aspects of the theme – Women Empowerment through Higher Education. Dr Jainul Hoque presented a paper on the role of Higher Education in empowering the Muslim Women in Assam. It focuses on the ratio of the Muslim girls in Higher Education compared to their counterparts in rural areas of Assam. A paper has been present on why Higher Education is an essential tool for achieving gender equality. Ratan Kumar Das has rightly highlighted the attitude of teachers and students towards gender disparity in Higher Education Institute in Tripura. A paper has strongly examined the key government initiatives and scholarships in Assam that have been instrumental in promoting women's education.

The Programme started with an inaugural session where Dr Deepak Kumar, IAS, Unakoti district, Tripura, has inaugurated the session. Prof Dr Chandrika Basu Majumder has given Keynote address and analytically read out the necessity of the seminar. # 5. Keynote Address

Wishing you a very good morning, to all the dignitaries present over here. First of all I would like to share my feelings with all of you when I am sharing the dais with my student and scholar Dr Dipikanta Chakraborty who pursued her PhD under my supervision. It gives me pride and pleasure to be here on the stage with her. I would like to congratulate Dr Chakraborty and the whole organising team for inviting me to this august gathering. I am indeed very happy to be here, meeting all of you and sharing my thoughts on the higher education system in general and the trends in the evaluation process in particular. I appreciate the team for selecting such a wonderful theme for the seminar. Friends, the education is the enlargement of mind but how could anyone enlarge the mind by depriving the half-sky?

My dear students, As per AISHE, the enrollment in higher education increases to 4.14 crore, increase of 7.5% from 2019-20 and female enrollment reaches 2 crore mark, increase of 13 Lakh from 2019-20. Female enrollment reaches 2 crore mark, increase of 13 Lakh from 2019-20. Gender Parity Index (GPI) has increased from 1 in 2017-18 to 1.05 in 2020-21. It is undoubtedly good news that shows the effective policies of Higher Education system in India for encouraging female participation.

But merely increasing the statistics will not relieve the Higher Education Institutions from empowering girls. In my class, I have personally targeted the female students from the economically weaker sections. With an anecdote, I am trying to explain my statement. One of the students from a PG batch was good and responsive in the class. I had discussed them the Domestic Violence Act, 2005. She enthusiastically participated in the class interaction. But to my great dismay, all my efforts went futile when I heard that she committed suicide subject to the domestic violence. These kinds of examples are a dime a dozen. The educated girls who are well aware of the Visakha Guidelines, i.e. the Sexual Harassment of Women at Workplace (Prevention, Prohibition and Redressal) Act but they have often been subjected to sexual violence. Hence, mere translation of the acts will not solve issues of the women for what they are getting education.
